ABR MISSION STATEMENT



ABR cares for orphaned and injured black bear cubs and yearlings for return to their natural wild habitat; increases public awareness about coexisting with black bears; and studies all aspects of returning cubs and yearlings to the wild.

ABR BEAR FACILITY





- 65-acre facility
 - Heavily forested
 - Mountainous terrain



 Adjacent 78-acre county-owned undeveloped property adds buffer space

MINIMIZE HUMAN CONTACT



- Force wean from bottles at 10 weeks
- Move to Cub House when weaned
- Minimize human contact when transferring to next level of care
- Use blind enclosures
- Throw food over fence in different areas and at different times of day
- Provide limited visibility overlook towers for Curators
- Allow only limited personnel at facility
- Use closed circuit cameras for visual access

PERMITTED BEARS







- Licensed for bears younger than 2 years of age
- Can keep individual bear for up to 1 year
- Bears returned to home states for release back to wild

YEARLINGS AT ABR



- Yearlings at ABR are usually injured, ill, or severely malnourished
- Yearlings are never housed with cubs of the year
- ABR must usually treat and repair injuries, treat illnesses, and treat yearlings for parasites so that they can thrive
- Yearlings stay only long enough to recover health and reach suitable release weight

FOSTERING NEONATES




- Fostering cubs to a sow with other cubs is possible during denning season
- Denning season in our area ends by about mid-April
- Wildlife officials must know den locations of collared sows
- Dens must be checked during the winter to assess the health of the sow and number of cubs in the den
- ABR coordinates with wildlife agencies to foster as often as possible

FOSTERING NEONATES









Neonates that arrive after bear families leave their dens make their first stop at the ABR Cub Nursery...

CUBS AT ABR - CUB NURSERY



- After foster season, cubs start their ABR stay in the Cub Nursery
- Climate controlled building with divided cages
- Cameras with sound provide Curators constant cub access without constant human contact
- Curators bottle feed cubs around the clock, stimulate to urinate and defecate
- Cubs have "stuffies", heartbeat "stuffies", cub caves and each other for comfort
- At 10 weeks of age, ABR Curators force wean the cubs from bottles and cubs learn to lap from bowls
- Cubs practice skills on small climbing structures

The Cub Nursery is soon too small and too close to humans. Time to move to an ABR Cub House...

CUBS AT ABR: CUB HOUSE



- Safe place to move cubs when they are weaned from bottle
- Temperature controlled
- Sanitary environment
- Easy monitoring with less human contact
- Larger space to encourage further development
- Cubs continue to practice their skills
- Easy and safe access for recapture, if necessary



- Building 2-acre enclosure
- Pens with open top

RELEASE DAY



- Releases coordinated with wildlife agencies
- Bears released as close as possible to their home territory
- Bears safely trapped into smaller enclosed pens for safety
- Bears immobilized for final checkup and markings
- Bears monitored throughout the immobilization process
- Bears leave ABR for release back to the wild where they belong
