




Drug Overdose Death Trends

Drug overdose deaths increased 15% in 2019. Although the number of deaths from prescription opioid overdoses (pain relievers) has been decreasing since 2017, overdose deaths due to fentanyl and methamphetamine have only continued to rise.

In 2019, more Tennesseans died from an overdose involving the illicit drug fentanyl than prescription opioids, a trend that reflects the shift from prescription to illicit drugs in the overdose epidemic.

In 2019, 3 out of 4 heroin overdose deaths also involved fentanyl

WHAT IS FENTANYL?

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that is similar to morphine but is 100 times more potent. It is a prescription drug that is also made and used illegally.

IS IT DEADLY?

A fatal dose of fentanyl is 2 MILLIGRAMS A pound of fentanyl contains 226,796 FATAL DOSES






GULF OF MEXICO

PACIFIC OCEAN



Maritime ports handle large volumes of merchandise and a significant portion of international trade, particularly between Asia and Mexico, so are logistically ideal for both legal and illegal trading of illicit substances.



Precursors are converted into fentanyl. Pure fentanyl is also laced into fake prescription pills. The different forms of fentanyl are then shipped with other drugs, although not mixed with them. The poly-drug loads are transported by land, air, or sea to the US border.



Manzanillo




The Pacific coast ports of Manzanillo and Lázaro Cárdenas, in particular, absorb fentanyl and fentanyl precursors arriving in Mexico, then dispatch them to storage and production points around Mexico City, Guadalajara, and Culiacán.

Human Trafficking



Human Trafficking

 Human trafficking is a hidden crime. Most cases are not reported because most people cannot identify the indicators of human trafficking. No common reporting system is used in Tennessee to aggregate the number of victims. However, the National Human Trafficking Hotline attempts to index the growth or decline of human trafficking in Tennessee.

Human Trafficking

In 2021 the Tennessee HT hotline received <u>525</u> signals, and <u>164</u> were from victims and survivors of human trafficking.

In 2021, <u>152</u> cases were identified with <u>217</u> victims involved.

Retail Theft

- (a) For purposes of § 39-14-103, a person commits theft of property if the person, with the intent to deprive a merchant of the stated price of merchandise, knowingly commits any of the following acts:
- (1) Conceals the merchandise;
- (2) Removes, takes possession of, or causes the removal of merchandise;
- (3) Alters, transfers or removes any price marking, or any other marking which aids in determining value affixed to the merchandise;
- (4) Transfers the merchandise from one (1) container to another;
- (5) Causes the cash register or other sales recording device to reflect less than the merchant's stated price for the merchandise;
- (6) Removes, destroys, deactivates, or evades any component of an antishoplifting or inventory control device to commit or facilitate a theft;
- (7) Uses any artifice, instrument, container, device, or other article to commit or facilitate a theft; or
- (8) Activates or interferes with a fire alarm system to commit or facilitate a theft.

Bat Creek Survey Results and Recommendations

- The new Tennessee law now in place is designed to protect the shorelines of homeowners' property (including docks) along Bat Creek from the harmful effects of Wake generating boats.
- Wake Boarding and Wake Surfing are no longer permitted in coves or any "portion of a body of water" with a width of less than 400 feet.
- Wake Boarding and Wake Surfing are not permitted with 200 feet of a "shoreline or a dock, pier, boathouse, or other structure located completely or partly on the water".
- The operator of a towing vessel and skier must not operate in a manner that endangers the safety of persons or property. A safe speed and distance from other vessels, persons in the water, docks, piers, and shorelines, must be maintained
 - It is recommended that Water Skiing, boat operation and PWC reduced to Slow-Idle speed within this same dock zone



Bat Creek Survey Results and Recommendations

- There are (6) designated narrow bodies of water along Bat Creek that pose potential safety hazards for boat and PWC operators and their passengers. These same areas will also be impacted by the new State boating guidelines concerning Wake Surfing or Wake boarding Activities. These should be identified by the association as "No Wake or Slow Idle Zones".
 - It is recommended that the end of Bat Creek along Wood Duck and the start of Sandpiper be designated as a "No Wake Zone" for Wake Surfing and Boarding Activities due to water depth and congestion.
- All Private and Community docks along Bat Creek should be treated the same as a with a 200 ft. idle and no wake zone surrounding them.



Bat Creek Survey Results and Recommendations

- With younger residents becoming a larger part of Rarity Bay it will be important to also remind boaters and PWC operator/owners that there are requirements to show proof and have in possession your TWRA issued Safe Boating card (Operators License).
 - All residents 35 years of age or under must have a TWRA Safe Boating Card, this includes PWC operators or any watercraft with 8.5 HP.
 - Persons under 12 years old may not operate a powered boat of more than 8.5 horsepower unless accompanied by an adult who can take immediate control of the vessel.
 - The owner of the boat/PWC is responsible for all operator's compliance and safe boating behaviors
- Updated notices should be communicated thru all concerned community groups to residents who are boat and PWC operators to reinforce these recreational boating guidelines and identify these areas.
 - As a public safety resource The USCGA will provide the content.




